FIRE BANS

- We had rain, why not lift the fire ban? A number of factors influence the decision to put a fire ban in place and when to lift the ban. Weather – (current & forecasted), moisture content of the forest fuels, and resources available to respond to an emergency.
- The Fire Department was EXTREMELY busy in May due to several area fires. All these fires started from human error and ALL spread due to dry grass and wind. Fires like these cost you the taxpayer money and put our VOLUNTEER firefighters at risk. Please obey the fire bans and when burning is allowed, please follow directions you are given with your fire permit.
- A preventive approach to fire consumes fewer resources and in general reduces the risk to life, both human and other.

Your cooperation is appreciated.

- ** A reminder that there is a daytime burning restriction at all times for the township**
- Burn permits for the township can be purchased at the township office for \$10.00, and they are good until December 31, 2018.
- Prior to burning the permit holder, or designate, shall call 705-782-6802 and leave a message containing the following information:
 - 1. Name
 - 2. Civic Address
 - 3. Permit Number
 - 4. Date & Time of intended fire

- Choose a safe time
 - Any fire is more likely to get out of control on a hot, dry or windy day. Burn two hours before sunset or later, and ensure that they are out two hours after sunrise.

- Keep your fire small
 - Keep your pile of wood, brush, or debris less than 2m in diameter and less than 2m high.
- Choose a safe site
 - Piles must be at least 2m from any other flammable materials.
- Stay with your fire
 - •If you start a fire outdoors, you must take all necessary steps to tend the fire, keep it under control, and extinguish it before leaving the site.

WHAT'S THE RISK IN JULY?

- § 9% of annual loss fires occur in July
 - § Average of 32 injuries
 - § Average of 4 fatalities
- § Top ignition sources: Cooking equipment Cigarettes Electrical distribution equipment

Smoke alarm / CO alarm inspections will begin this spring and carry on randomly through the balance of the year; both of these alarms are now required by provincial law. You can be charged if you do not have smoke/ CO2 alarms probably installed in your home.
