In an attempt to keep our roads open and safe during the melt, we undertook a ditching program along some of the more traveled roads. Some callers expressed concerns over the amount of ditching while other callers requested more. Overall, I was impressed with the level of interest from our community on this matter but want to emphasize that we will always err on the side of human health, safety, and the environment.

On a more positive note, on March 20 the Township of Johnson was awarded a one-time grant of \$256,200 from the Ministry of Municipal Affairs and Housing. 

### FIRE DEPARTMENT NEWS AND TIPS

#### **CLOSE BEFORE YOU DOZE!**

The Close Your Door safety initiative comes as the result of over 10 years of research by the Underwriter's Laboratory Firefighter Safety Research Institute (FSRI). After proving that a closed door could potentially save lives in a fire, UL FSRI has committed to share this finding with the world.

Fire is getting faster due to the types of plastics and foams that are now found in building materials and furniture— 40 years ago you had an average of 17 minutes to escape a fire—

NOW YOU HAVE 3 MINUTES!

You know how important it is to have working smoke alarms, escape plans, and a designated meeting place in case of a fire. But did you know that closing your doors in your home is also important for your safety? Closed doors can reduce fire growth, limit damage to your home, keep temperatures down, and can even save your life if you become trapped.

#### Here are the stats:

MAKE A 900 DEGREE DIFFERENCE - A closed door can mean reducing 1,000 degrees down to 100 degrees.

TAKE IT DOWN A NOTCH - During a fire, a closed door can keep carbon monoxide levels at 1,000 PPM versus 10,000 PPM if the door is left open.

**TAKE A BREATHER -** A fire needs oxygen to burn. A

closed door keeps more oxygen in the room and away from the fire. When you exit a fire, make sure to close your door behind you to slow down its growth.

DOZE SAFELY - 50% of house fires happen between 11 p.m. and 7 a.m. Closing your doors before you hit the hay helps keep you safe.
