Notes from Council Minutes of July 24 and August 27 Council accepts or approves:

- The drafting of a policy concerning the collection of additional costs/fees for Land Use Planning services. Council believes these costs should be borne by the applicant and the Township is allowed by the Municipal Act to charge such fees.
- Preparation by staff of the necessary bylaws and other documentation to reduce the speed limit on Gordon Lake road, north of the Gordon Lake Hall, and the speed limit on Highway 17 through the hamlet of Desbarats
- A donation of \$500 to the Bruce Mines Agricultural Society fair and exhibition, recognizing that many township residents are either members of the Society or participants in the fair.

Council supports:

· the Township of Prince and other like-minded com-

munities to support the Rural Ontario Municipal Association in its efforts for a standalone, dedicated annual conference that would continue to bring benefits to all municipalities through a progressive, diversified and interesting agenda

Council directs:

Mayor Mersereau to write to the Federal Immigration Minister to state the benefits of an Immigration Program in the Township. A Pilot Program for small northern communities is planned for Sault Ste. Marie, and Council believes that an extension of the program to Johnson Township would be a benefit in diversification and economic development.

COMMUNITY NIGHT 2019



FIRE DEPARTMENT NEWS & TIPS

Reminder: As we feel the chill in the air in the mornings
- time to check heating equipment before we start
them up for the season. Portable units used for keeping the hunting cabin warm are vulnerable for producing Carbon Monoxide.

Portable Fuel-Fired Heater Safety Tips

Issue 75

- Any portable fuel-fired heater should be equipped with a safety tip-over shut-off feature and bear the mark of an accredited testing agency.
- Only adults familiar with the operating and refueling procedures of the heater should be allowed to operate or refuel it.
- Before operating any portable fuel-fired heater read and follow the manufacturer's instructions.
- Always maintain an adequate supply of fresh outside air when using fuel-fired portable heaters indoors. Fol low manufacturer's directions to ensure proper ventilation.
- Heaters should never be left burning overnight or while sleeping.
- Refuel portable heaters outdoors, only after the unit has cooled. Only use approved fuel in the heater.
- Store fuel for the portable heater in the appropriate approved fuel container, outside the home.
- Keep portable heaters at least one metre (3 feet) away from anything that can burn, including curtains, wall coverings, upholstery, clothing and people.
- Keep all doorways and halls clear. In case of fire, a heater should not be blocking your escape.
- Place heaters in areas where they will not get bumped or knocked over.
- Prevent burns by keeping children away from portable heaters which can reach extremely high surface temperatures.
- Install working smoke alarms on every storey of the home and outside all sleeping areas to alert you to a fire in your home. Develop and practice a home fire escape plan with your family.
- Install a carbon monoxide alarm to alert you to the presence of deadly carbon monoxide gas.
